When we have any problem, the answer is always found in God. In His being, in His strength, and in the faith we put in Him.

Psalm 46:10 says, "Be still, and know that I am God: I will be exalted among the heathen, I will be exalted in the earth." Having the knowledge of and the faith in God's power is what we need when we feel there is no answer.

Maybe we just need to stop scrambling for the specifics and just trust the One who knows why.
