Perhaps the thought of Christmas brings the scent of steaming gingerbread and frosty pine or the sight of a crackling fire and presents under a sparkling Christmas tree. Maybe you shivered, thinking of the cold, gracefully falling snowflakes and your friend pouring a rather large quantity of snow down the back of your snowsuit. Do you imagine the innkeeper as rude? Luke 2:7 states that Mary, "gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." In truth, he was honest and had no ill intent when turning them away. Anyone of us could have been placed in his position and we might have done just as he did.

It is important to remember that his role in this story is part of God's plan. Isaiah prophesied in 53:2-3 that Jesus would be "despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. Like one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not." Max Lucado, an American author and minister, said, "the mother and father of our Lord were pushed out and rejected. Even before

he was born, our Lord was rejected and turned away. The words 'no room for you' followed him throughout his life...there was just no room for him anywhere."

Without knowing it we can become just like the innkeeper. Our lives can quickly become filled with other things that will never fully satisfy our 'hunger.' God "...is still being crowded out. With all the festivities and all the busyness, he is often just an afterthought. Instead of a place of honor at this time of year, Christ is often shoved into a corner" (Max Lucado). He came to find room for us. Have you made room for him?

Why Did God Choose Mary?

"And in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God unto a city of Galilee, named Nazareth, To a virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary.."

- Luke 1:26-27
