A Guide To Modesty



That it's fine to cuss someone off because we feel like it? Proverbs 15:1 says, "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger."

Think about it this way: if Jesus was standing next to you, would you talk *exactly* the way you do when you're angry?
